Featured Columnist: Tom Case's Insights on Successful Leadership

Editor's Note: Following the well-received column by 2014 AGC of America Senior Vice President Chuck Greco, the CLC Steering Committee proudly presents this issue's column by Tom Case, 2014 AGC of America National Highway and Transportation Division Chair and Senior Vice President and Operations Services Manager of Granite Construction.

What makes a successful leader? First, successful leaders must be aware and agile. Awareness is an ability to quickly assess and perceive self, others and situations. Agility is an ability to adjust to assessments and perceptions when situations or surroundings change. Often leaders fail due to a lack of personal or professional awareness, or a general resistance to change.

Second, successful leaders have an inner drive and motivation. Others work hard when a leader exhibits the drive and work ethic to build and maintain a successful business.

Third, successful leaders are both genuine and humble. In <u>Good to Great</u>, author Jim Collins defines a "Level 5 Leader" as someone with both traditional leadership skills (high capability, team player attitude, management skills) and a unique kind of humility. Research shows that companies with humble leaders consistently outperform their peers. This makes sense – humble leaders allow others the room to learn, grow and develop because it serves the greater good of the teams they lead. Humble leaders listen and can follow, again a sign of teamwork and agility. Many construction industry veterans can think of a leader in their company who set aside positional influence, power and authority to help them *(Continued on page 3)*
