

73	65	82	114	165	217	272	305	313	388	464


500+% Increase Since 2011

Preventable Death Rankings








Overdoses Are Outpacing Motor Vehicle Crashes

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

Solutions

- Naloxone Programs
- Tackling Opioid addiction via upstream intervention
 - Stigma
 - Chronic Pain/ Injuries
 - Recovery Friendly Workplaces
 - Coping and Resilience Strategies
 - Total Worker Health Approach





Naloxone: An Overdose Preparedness Tool

- Opioids disrupt our brain's ability to regulate breathing
- Naloxone temporarily stops an opioid overdose, allowing a return to normal breathing
- Narcan and RiVive have recently been approved for over-thecounter use







Naloxone is Safe & Effective

- Multiple studies have found that increased overdose education and naloxone distribution has saved lives
- Only affects individuals undergoing opioid involved overdoses
- Easy to administer anyone can save a life!
- After reviving a person using naloxone, they should receive medical attention just like any other emergency





What Happens after Naloxone?

Once the person starts breathing again, they might experience:

- Disorientation
- Confusion
- Headache
- Nausea

What responders can do:

- Talk calmly & gently
- Remove hazards
- Reassure the person that they are safe
- Explain what is happening



Obtaining Naloxone

- Having naloxone provides a chance for recovery it does not increase opioid use
- How do I get naloxone?
 - Local harm reduction organizations & health departments
 - Local pharmacies
 - Bulk order with manufacturers NSC

 Share Community Accessibly Resources with Employees for Personal Supplies





Storage Considerations

- Could be stored in first aid kits or other accessible locations such as AED cabinets
- Doses needed depend on worker density – 2 dose minimum per kit
- Avoid above 104 degrees and under 32 degrees*
- Expiration date approximately every 3 years*

Barriers to Workplace Naloxone Program



Liability Concerns

- All 50 States have Naloxone Access Laws
- Good Samaritan Laws differ among the states



Stigma

- **Negative Attitudes About Substance Use** or People with Addiction Affect Ability to Find Help and Recover
- Survey Respondents Were 6 Times Less Likely to Hire a Person If They Expressed Prejudicial Views Against Someone with a Substance Use Disorder*


Naloxone Program Considerations

Storage & Doses needed maintenance Proper storage Education on opioids and substance use **Education** • Training requirements on overdose and naloxone use (who & when) Record management Workplace Staff roles procedures Program maintenance Communication of policy Resources such as EAPs, treatment, peer-Workplace support, etc. supports and Fair-chance policies benefits Recovery-ready workplace



Employers' Role

Naloxone is One Piece of a Comprehensive Substance Use & Mental Health Workplace Program





Roadmap

- **Timeline:** Launching beta version in February
- Initial focus: Substance use & mental health
 - Content informed by recovery ready framework
- 4 "stops": benefits, policies, data collection, employee education & training






Cost Benefit of Addressing Substance Use

- It is estimated that the economic cost of opioid use disorder and fatal opioid overdose in 2017 was \$150 billion
- Employers can save an Average of \$8,500 for supporting each employee in recovery from substance use disorder





Annual costs based on location in IL, 100 employees, & construction industry





WORK to Save Lives Act H.R. 5420/S. 2948

- Guidance for private sector employers to have medications onsite with trained employees
- Mandate for federal sites to have medications with trained employees
- Bipartisan legislation introduced in the House & Senate
 - Bonnie Watson Coleman (D-NJ)
 Nancy Mace (R-SC)
 - David Trone (D-MD)
 - Brittney Pettersen (D-CO)

- John Rutherford (R-FL)
- Doug Lamborn (R-CO)
- NSC is working with state legislatures to replicate this
