

Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act

What is in it for direct federal construction contractors?

The <u>AGC-supported</u> Senate bipartisan infrastructure package, the <u>Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act</u>, would invest more than \$1.2 trillion in the nation's roads, bridges, transit systems, airports, ports and waterways, drinking water and wastewater systems, energy infrastructure, and more. • Gives Broad Discretion to Federal Agencies
